His next undertaking focuses on the emergence of the global "Occupy movement" enabling masculine elements to remain the dominant power in shaping aspects of survival in the world. Furthermore, the Occupy movement protests how the global financial system controls the world in a way that disproportionally benefits a minority in an unsustainable way. The show will include 260 dated ocean images representing the working days of the Western monetary system, a series of Western masculine characters with their reflections in the water at low tide and three videos exploring constructed identity within systems of patriarchy, masculinities and money.
